Equality, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI)



The EDI team met on 15th May and had a lively discussion, including feedback from the recent Group Leaders' meeting.

Amongst the suggestions put forward was that individual groups could be asked to say what they are doing, either routinely or as a one-off event, to further EDI initiatives. They should be encouraged to try something new to embrace diversity. We should also seek opportunities to include more diverse topics in the monthly meeting programme, such as the Indian dance group arranged for the October meeting. The programme could also include more participatory sessions where members could 'have their say'.

He talked about the humble origins of Richard Arkwright and his incredible drive and perseverance which led him to establish this the first ever factory and then many others. He also talked about the working and living conditions of the workers – predominantly women and children.

The village of Cromford was built to accommodate the workers, and by the standards of the day the housing was good. Today the village boasts disused pig sties with listed monument status! In the afternoon we took a trip on the Ecclesbourne Heritage Railway. The stock was old and reminiscent of many an old train journey, for some of us. Those were the days before air conditioning and Wi-Fi. We were able to enjoy looking out on the very sunny and pleasant countryside whilst enjoying a cream scone and cake, along with copious amounts of tea and coffee. It was nothing like the old British Rail sandwiches of the past. All helped along by a very jovial red-hatted guard (pictured left with some of our party).

Glenfield Hospital Secret Garden

Calling all gardening enthusiasts. Did you know that a veritable gem of a garden lies tucked away within the grounds of Glenfield Hospital? Once the walled kitchen garden of the mansion house that still stands to one side of the modern hospital building, the garden was for many years used for therapeutic purposes. Sadly, it fell into neglect several decades ago, until a far-sighted member of staff recognised its potential and set the restoration ball rolling.

The first eighteen months of the project largely involved clearing the debris and rampant growth that smothered the one acre site. Then came a major breakthrough when the garden was picked to host the semi-final of Channel 5's Great Garden Challenge, resulting in the creation of four small garden rooms that are now central to the overall design.

Since then, with input from commercial organisations and private donations, including financial support from University Hospitals of Leicester NHS Trust and the Leicester Hospitals Charity, the Secret Garden, as it is now known, has literally blossomed into life. Community Payback teams have tackled much of the heavy work, while enthusiastic volunteers, myself included, are responsible for

most of the actual gardening. Apart from staff seconded during the pandemic and three heady months when we enjoyed the luxury of a full-time gardener, it's all been down to us.

During the pandemic, many hospital staff found the garden an invaluable haven. Today, it's increasingly appreciated as a place not only to enjoy free time, but also as a space for outdoor meetings. Patients are, of course, also regular visitors. Future plans involve using the garden for therapeutic and community activities. Although the Secret Garden is entering a new phase in its life, original features still remain, including a row of gnarled espaliered apple trees that have lovingly been pruned back into something vaguely resembling their original shape (or so we fondly hope!)

If you would like to share my enjoyment of the Secret Garden, it's open under the National Garden Scheme on **Saturday 24th June / 22nd July (10.30 am – 3.30 pm).** Admission £3.50, no charge for children. Parking will probably be free within designated areas, but this has yet to be confirmed.

In Praise of the IT Help Desk

I understand that the Help Desk is not used very much, so I thought I'd write this wee piece in its praise. In case there are any readers who don't know what "Help Desk" means in the digital world (as I didn't once upon a time), it is not a physical desk staffed by human beings (though it could be). It is a term used to cover people offering advice about any problem we may have when using our computers.

I used computers when in work and as the manager was the go-to person for simple queries, but that was when there was far less complexity. I think I'm reasonably intelligent, but.....

I hate computers and hate them even more when they do something I haven't asked them to do! I was delighted to find that I could contact one of the Charnwood u3a volunteers on the Help Desk to sort me out. Their names and contact details are listed below. They have stopped my blood pressure reaching boiling point several times.



The person I spoke to was very patient, seemed to understand what I was trying to say (I don't necessarily use the correct terminology) and was skilful at explaining things in ways I could understand. One example was that my computer was showing that, though plugged in, it was not charging and was in danger of running out of charge altogether. I had some important work to complete so was not a happy bunny. He patiently told me how to find the battery (I had no idea there was one) and led me through a number of things to check. It turned out that it was actually a loose connection to the power adapter: so easily fixed! I now know to check that connection. My problem has been resolved each time I've made contact.

Many people have a resident technical expert living with them, or round the corner (i.e. partner, relative or friend). My technical experts are several hundred miles away and friends locally cannot necessarily help. I can't be the only one in that situation!

So...don't worry about revealing your difficulties. Be assured that you will meet with patience and understanding.



For the last four years, Charnwood u3a has been using the Beacon membership management system to help with the administration of our organisation. Beacon has been of great benefit to the committee and the leaders of our larger groups but, as noted in the December 2022 issue of News & Views, it does have some shortcomings. The Third Age Trust has been slowly tackling these issues but there are still no plans to address Beacon's biggest weaknesses and the Charnwood u3a Committee believes that the only way to fix those is to move to another, better system.

The system we have chosen is called **Simple Membership** (SM) and we formally applied for a live Simple Membership site on 11th May. The new system provides both membership management functions and a website; it will eventually replace both our existing website and Beacon. The switchover will start around the end of June. The Committee will start using SM as soon as it goes live, but group leaders will have until March next year to become familiar with it and start using it for their group(s).

The first thing you will notice is that we will have a brand new website. It will be visually very different and the structure will change significantly too. We hope you will find the new look



more appealing and easier to navigate. For example, above are the Home and Login pages of the current website/Beacon (on the left) and the SM trial site we have been using for testing (on the right).

We will be running a series of training sessions for group leaders over the next few months, just as we did for Beacon. Please let Bey, our Groups Coordinator, know if you would like to attend one of these sessions.

Member's Story

Coffee Please

Recent short stories, recounting my experiences over 70+ years, have revealed much of my character to my readers. Happily it seems these stories have proved entertaining and worth the effort. However I realised there is one highly significant area that I haven't touched on so far how my wife Helen and I got together.

How did I meet Helen? It was 1972, and we were studying at Sheffield University. Helen was living in typical private student digs. I was in a Hall of Residence.

It was the start of the 2nd year and people were generally getting into some serious socialising. In particular, Helen and others had just descended on my friend Steve who had the room opposite me. There was a general call for someone to rustle up

some tea and coffee. Steve suggested that they called on me as he knew that I was a good bet for having the necessary supplies. So they banged on my door calling for tea and coffee.

What was unusual was me being in bed trying to recover from glandular fever. This didn't stop friends from cramming into my room. One of this crowd was an attractive, tall, slim lady wearing a large floppy hat who spoke with a Northern accent. She

had made herself comfortable sitting on the edge of my bed as I was encouraged (OK pushed!) to get on with sorting out the drinks. So there I was, walking down the corridor, wearing some jeans and not much else, carrying a collection of mugs for coffee. (I was 'the mug carrying the mugs'!)

At this time I was seeing a girl from home in Hertfordshire and this was well known amongst our friends. This was Helen's and my first meeting, but not when we got together; that happened some months later.

My relationship with the girl from home broke down later in the year and my parents took me away for a long weekend in Gibraltar to help me to get over the failure. Helen and others of our friends concluded

that I came from a wealthy family who had the time and money to whisk me off to Gibraltar to get over a heartbreak. This might have made me more interesting, especially as I had a car as well. Yes, I had a car and yes it was pretty rare for a student in those days. Luckily I bought a used car from a modest inheritance. This seemed to give me 'wheel appeal' with Helen later telling her mother in a letter home, "... and he has a car!" (but still no great wealth).

The truth soon got out: my father worked for an airline and he could get virtually free flights anywhere in Europe. Moreover, the trip had been arranged some time before my upset. My parents simply got hold of another flight ticket for next to nothing. I didn't have a current passport but I was able to get a travel permit for Gibraltar cheaply. So no sign of significant wealth!

I still hadn't got together with Helen. So when did it happen? On the first evening back at the start of the summer term of 1973, I decided to pop into a local pub, where I hadn't been previously, in the hope of meeting some friends. When I arrived I noticed that Helen was there. So was this our first thing? Nope, almost, but not quite!

When I got back to my room I called on Steve and during our chat he confirmed that Helen was

not seeing anyone at that time.

The following evening I drove round to the digs shared by Helen and Joyce, Steve's girlfriend. Helen answered the door and said "Have you come to pick up Joyce?". "No, I've come to see you actually" I replied. "Oh, OK would you like a coffee?" said Helen.

So there we have it; coffee featured again. It was the start of my 50-year relationship with an attractive, tall, slim, clever lass from Lancashire. Yes I learnt that Helen was from Salford - a district in Manchester, I thought! It didn't take long for Helen to correct my ignorance! [Ed: and still correcting him even now!]
