going on to explore Liverpool's many attractions.


The Albert Dock is also home to a statue of 60s singing star and Liverpudlian Billy Fury. The


religious architecture, culture, nostalgia via the The Beatles and shopping, depending upon your interests. Others in the group investigated the city by foot.

Robert's Recommended Reads

Cu3a member **Robert Jackson's** recommendations for November are two absorbing thrillers by Len Deighton and Graham Greene.

Mamista by Len Deighton

published in 1991

Widely acclaimed for his exceptional spy thrillers, Mamista is one of Len Deighton's less well known novels.

The story is set mainly in the fictional South American country of Spanish Guiana. The central character is American citizen Angel Paz. Privileged and idealistic, Paz is determined to join the

Marxist revolutionaries in the southern provinces of Spanish Guiana: the 'Movimiento de Accion Marxista', the 'MAM' of the title.

Arriving in Spanish Guiana, Paz meets Ralph Lucas, an Australian former army surgeon, sent by his employer to assess the merits of supplying medicines to the people of the southern provinces. Meeting with the Mamista leaders, charismatic Ramon and the enigmatic Inez Cassidy, the two men become involved, Paz intentionally, Lucas unwittingly with the activities of the guerrillas.

A kidnapping, intending to grab two American citizens from an oil research station, goes badly wrong when the wife of one of the hostages is killed.

The fast paced, thrilling narrative moves between the guerrillas, the White House and the 'Federalistas', the Spanish Guiana government's ruthless police force, hunting the Mamistas. The involvement of the C.I.A. becomes evident as the trade off between a new source of crude oil for the US, the 'management' of the cocaine trade and the possible advantages to the US of supporting Mamista are evaluated. The US President's ruthless and manipulative 'Special Advisor' emerges as a key player in the unfolding story.

Stamboul Train by Graham Greene

published in 1932

This superbly crafted story is set around the time of writing, on the 'Orient Express' train, travelling between Ostend and Constantinople (Istanbul), via Cologne, Vienna, and Belgrade.

Wealthy Jewish businessman Carleton Myatt, strolling through the train, comes across showgirl and dancer Coral Musker, seated in second class. Clearly distressed and feeling ill, Coral is helped from the cabin by Myatt who then seeks medical help. Fellow passenger Dr Richard John comes to Coral's assistance. Myatt and Coral subsequently become involved in a romantic relationship.

Travelling journalist Mabel Warren realises that Dr John is actually Dr Richard Czinner, missing since absconding from his trial for treason in Belgrade, five years earlier. Determined to secure a scoop, Mabel leaves the train when it stops at Vienna station to telephone her London newspaper. Her handbag is stolen by Josef Grunlich, a petty criminal. Grunlich, using Mabel's money, joins the train, leaving Mabel stranded in Vienna.

Mabel Warren's newspaper prints her bulletin, resulting in the train being halted and searched at Subotica, near Belgrade. Czinner is apprehended and held in custody, awaiting the arrival of the chief of police from Belgrade. Coral and Josef are unwittingly caught up in the confusion of the search and miss the departing train. When the train breaks down a few miles along the track, Myatt realises that Coral is not aboard, so he pays a local resident to drive him back to Subotica to look for her.

The plot now takes a more sinister turn with unexpected consequences for some of the characters. To avoid further 'spoilers' I'll give no more details!

Designing Better Ways to Support Future Healthcare

As featured in last month's *News & Views*, Doctoral Researcher Ning Fu of Loughborough University's School of Design and Creative Arts is still looking for more participants for her study which aims to design health management tools that better support older people in managing their long-term conditions.

Criteria for participation in the study:

- adults aged 65 or older (born 1959 or earlier)
- · have more than one physical chronic condition
- living independently at home alone or with another older adult

You would be invited for a friendly interview (approx. 1 hour), conducted one-to-one, in person, at a time convenient for you, normally in the Design School Building (but adjustments can be made on demand). During the interview, you will be asked about your thoughts and experiences of how you manage your health conditions in your daily life. There are no right or wrong answers; the researchers are simply interested in understanding what works or doesn't work for you.

You are welcome to ask any questions before deciding whether to participate, and can withdraw at any time (even during the interview), for any reason, without needing to provide an explanation.

After interview, each participant will receive a £13 gift card from a local supermarket as a token of appreciation.

News from the National u3a



Third Age Trust AGM

The TAT AGM, held earlier this month, saw several momentous changes, including a new leadership team, with a new CEO, Chair and Vice Chair. The meeting also saw members vote on a resolution to change the articles of association of the Third Age Trust. This passed with 905 out of 1073 total votes in favour. The Board and staff will now start working towards a new governance structure, which will include a smaller Board and a Council made up of regional u3a representatives. Both will be in place by April 2025.

Obituary

Ute Maria Foggensteiner 1940 - 2024

We were sad to hear that this longstanding Charnwood u3a member and former group leader had recently died, and we pass on our condolences to her family and friends.

David Fell has provided the following tribute:

Ute Foggensteiner came to England with her husband in 1965 from Vienna, having been born there in 1940 in an era of great upheaval and austerity. The resilience required to survive such times was evident in her later life. They had lived in Lucca, Italy before the UK, and it was there that she embraced the Italian language, for which those of us who encountered her in the Cu3a Italian conversation group were grateful.

Moving to Canada in 1967, she studied linguistics and Russian at McGill University, Montreal before returning to Buckinghamshire in 1977 prior to arriving in Leicestershire in 1983. She continued in academic activities and graduated from the University of Leicester in 1989 with a degree in History of Art. Ute then taught German and Italian at both Leicester and De Montfort Universities, retiring in 2000.

Charnwood u3a was then able to benefit from Ute's energy and enthusiasm for language and learning. She joined the Italian conversation group and became its group leader in 2014 until 2018, maintaining her customary high but fair standards. She was extremely well-read and joined book groups and a political discussion group. She joined the Cu3a Classical Civilisation group in 2021 and was a regular and enthusiastic contributor.

Her generosity of spirit, wry humour and linguistic experience were much appreciated by those who were fortunate to meet her. She will be sadly missed.
